My dear parishioners,

In recent weeks we have experienced tragedies in New York and Denver, following the terror and loss in Las Vegas. From our 24/7 news world come negative comments of all sorts, exaggerations, half-truths, and confusing statements that distract and divide us. **We need unity. A Prayer of Thanksgiving

Gather with your parish family at 10am on Thanksgiving Day, **November 23** for a bilingual (English and Spanish) celebration of the Eucharist—the greatest act of thanksgiving for Christians. Psalm 116 challenges us: "**What return can I make to the Lord for all that he gives to me?** I will take the cup of salvation, and call on the name of the Lord." Let's together accept the cup of salvation offered at such great cost and make just return to Him of our very selves! The Thanksgiving Day offertory will benefit the many Social Justice ministries at St. Matthew's – reach deep!

Seeing the Hopeful Signs

Advent invites us to prepare ourselves for Christ's coming anew so that we and our world may be touched and transformed by God's mercy and love. One way to use this opportunity profitably is to reflect on Pope Francis' words to the U.S. Congress and adopt our own small steps towards changing ourselves and our world:

"All of us are quite aware of, and deeply worried by, the disturbing social and political situation of the world today. Our world is increasingly a place of violent conflict, hatred and brutal atrocities, committed even in the name of God and of religion. Our response must be one of hope and healing, of justice and peace. Our efforts must aim at restoring hope, righting wrongs, maintaining commitments, and thus promoting the well-being of individuals and of peoples in a renewed spirit of fraternity and solidarity, cooperating generously for the common good." —Pope Francis, address to the U. S. Congress on September 24, 2015

During each of the four weeks of Advent, let us focus on one of the four themes suggested by Pope Francis hope and healing, justice and peace.

I thank all who participated in our **Offertory Appeal**. The weekly offertory is our mainstay, the one source we count on, and from which we pay our daily expenses. A full report on the Appeal will be sent to you soon.

Planned gifts also are an important resource for our mission. Bequests allow you to leave something to your parish without loss of comfort or security in your lifetime. If your estate is subject to estate tax, your gift is entitled to an estate tax charitable deduction for its full value. Securities are another option. The best stocks

for charitable giving are those that have increased in value, particularly those producing little income. Selling the stock would require payment of capital gains tax. Increases in value of donated stocks, however, are exempt from capital gains tax. A gift of real estate offers you the opportunity to make a significant charitable contribution with a tax-friendly outcome.
